COMMUNITY TRANSFORMATION THROUGH SOCIAL INNOVATIONS

OBJECTIVES

- A think tank that uses the public health approach to violence prevention and intervention to reduce the disproportionate rates of firearm related homicides, and serious violence in Black Canadian communities.
- Advocate for trauma-informed and proven best practices city wide with the mandate of developing a national strategy.
- Facilitate collaborations and partnerships with all three levels of government, community organizations and other stakeholders to create and implement evidence-based violence prevention and intervention strategies.

ISSUES TO ADDRESS

- Disproportionate Black homicide victimization and perpetration, with a particular focus on children/youth under 18 years of age.
- The recent increased involvement of children and youth charged in homicides (90 in 2022
 compared with an average of 44 charged per year over the preceding five years [2017-2021]).
- The lack, at all levels of government, of comprehensive mandates to co-construct effective strategies that will allow for safer Black Canadian communities.

ANALYSIS

Black Canadians are disproportionately overrepresented in homicide victimization. Black Canadians account for:

- 4.3% of the Canadian adult population; and
- 5.5% of the Ontario adult population.

NATIONAL [6]


- 2020: 764 homicide victims
 90 (12%) Black, 5.95 per 100,000,
 39 youth
- 2021: 796 homicide victims,
 119 (15%) Black, 7.38 per 100,000,
 33 Youth
- <u>2022</u>: 874 homicides victims, 114 (13%) Black, 6.70 per 100,000 90 Youth

PROVINCIAL (ONTARIO) [7]

- 2020: 243 homicide victims 46 (19%) Black, 6.00 per 100,000
- 2021: 281 homicides victims
 75 (27%) Black, 9.30 per 100,000
- 2022: 288 homicides victims 74 (26%) Black, 8.78 per 100,000



NATIONAL & PROVINCIAL (ONTARIO) HOMICIDES BY YEAR 1000



Homicide is the costliest offence Direct and indirect costs to tax payers:

2022 National Cost of homicide \$4.19B to \$5.15B

2022 Toronto Cost of homicide [4] \$340.8M to \$418.9M

\$4.8million to \$5.9million®

PHASE 1

Awareness through Knowledge Mobilization:

- Identify root causes using quantitative and qualitative data sets and analysis. Present findings in accessible formats - publications, infographics, op-eds, journal publications, documentary focusing on the Canadian context. etc.
- Start and maintain a national conversation by hosting conferences, symposiums, and forums with violent crimes and gun violence prevention and intervention strategies at the forefront.

PHASE 2

Capacity Building with Community:

- Share evidenced based best practices from current YAAACE community safety programs, and global best practices.
- Curate a network of B3 organizations to holistically support marginalized communities and offer capacity consultations e.g. IRCAs, and supports for: transition, reintegration, and mental health.
- Facilitate multi-sectoral and governmental (municipal. provincial and federal) partnerships.

PHASE 3

Development & Implementation of Innovative Solutions:

- Develop policy and a national strategy with community consultation, multi sectoral, and trilevel government involvement.
- · Establish, operationalize, and evaluate qualitative and quantitative Key Performance Indicators (KPI) to mitigate root building workshops, training, and causes of violence and ultimately enhance safer and thriving communities.
 - · Pilot new culturally reflective programs and services through social innovation and consistently measure their efficacy and effectiveness.

PUBLIC HEALTH APPROACH

- Focuses on the entire population through largescale intervention and prevention programs
- Works to address risk and protective factors that determine the health and well-being of a population
